Course description:

This team-taught course explores the arts and the humanities with a thematic and topical selection of texts, performances, exhibits, and readings that span the human experience from the first civilizations to the present. To provide depth to this exploration, we will focus on some basic questions, such as: What is art? What is beauty? What is human?

In addition to attending class lectures, successful students in this course experience the arts and humanities as active viewers, listeners and participants by attending a theater performance, creating an installation, visiting an art museum, and viewing an assigned film.

Course objectives:

- Introduce students to significant works of human creativity through an examination of primary texts in the arts and humanities.
- Introduce students to basic concepts, techniques, and methods of creating and analyzing works of art in various forms and mediums
- Foster critical thinking in the interpretation and evaluation of the visual and performing arts as well as of literary texts
- Encourage students to actively explore their own imagination and creativity
- Enable students to understand works of art and the humanities in terms of text, context and subtext

Requirements:

- Attend class and scheduled events outside of class times (see below)
- Participate in class. This includes listening; asking informed questions and making informed comments; making group presentations; engaging in learning exercises, and communicating with your designated instructor
- Read or view assigned materials (see materials and schedule of readings below)
