I. Approval of agenda

III. Chair's report, Jackie Trischman: • The Academic Excellence & Student Success Fee Task Force is meeting with the Student Fee Advisory Committee; the expectations for what the task force was going to deliver to the SFAC is different from that which was delivered. Significant discussion and recommendation was stripped from the final product. The SFAC is supposed to deliver a recommendation to the president in one week. The process has become frustrating--possibly due to the transition in task force leadership--and Trischman will be discussing this with Oberem and Haynes. • A workload survey has gone out to the standing committee chairs and responses are due April 15<sup>th</sup>. • The officers plan to make two three-unit course releases available to the vice chair in future. • Mike Schroder, Extended Learning dean, has agreed to provide six units of course release funding annually to the Senate to support Senate work in support of EL, and will also fund a UCC retreat. In response to questions about campus-wide EL support for students, Schroder will be providing an analysis of current areas of support that will provide a basis for further discussion. • Concerning priorities in the three-year rolling plans, Trischman asked for input from the standing committee chairs from the faculty perspective. Salary compression remediation is an example of such a priority. Another example is faculty development for online course conversion. • Trischman asked EC members to encourage colleagues to run for Senate and committees.

IV. Interim Provost's report, Graham Oberem: • Oberem is pleased with the cross-divisional perspective represented in the priorities being advanced in the three-year rolling plan process, and thanked Trischman for encouraging a faculty-wide perspective. • Seleski has agreed to chair the new Provost's Space Advisory Group and that group will begin meeting as soon as possible. • Seleski was also asked to put together a group to discuss the schedule in terms of priorities, guiding principles, etc. This will be a small working group. • The AVP-AP search is underway. • Oberem will plan to discuss the restructuring survey report with the president upon her return to campus next week.

# VI. Committee reports

- **APC:** The committee continues to discuss the intersession policy. The committee is also working on a revision to the challenge exam policy in an effort to make it easier to use. They are also considering the definition of full-time enrollment in summer as it impacts financial aid eligibility.
- **FAC:** The committee has been reviewing the varied feedback received on the Department Chair Selection policy as well as changes to the university RTP policy.
- **LATAC:** The committee recently met with Carmen Mitchell to discuss a possible policy on open access to CSUSM faculty literature and the issues surrounding attempting such a repository. Input on this is welcomed.
- **PAC:** The committee is completing its responses to the Sociology and Nursing reviews. MOU meetings have been scheduled for programs in their second year of review. Orientations are being planned for programs starting their first year review next year.
- **UCC:** The committee is reviewing four programs: Palliative Care, Kinesiology, Geospatial Studies, and a Global Teacher Studies and Prep certificate.

**B. GEC LDGE certification forms** Carr noted that the forms have been updated to facilitate streamlined review and include the General Education Learning Outcomes (GELOs) approved by the Senate last spring as well as the LEAP (Liberal Education and America's Promise) guidelines.

**E. FAC Library RTP revision** Nava noted that this document has been completely revised; thus, no markup is available. Major changes include the addition of professional performance requirements and new categories for research and creative activities. **F.** APC Academic calendar for 2014/15 through 2017/18 Thompson noted that summer of 2015 has an extra week. The committee also decided that when the actual Veterans Day falls on a day other than the recognized day (i.e., on a Saturday), classes would be cancelled. It was suggested that the word "state" on line 35 be capitalized, if it refers to the State of California. It was noted that the winter intersession does not appear on the academic calendar.
